

Plenary Speakers to Include:

Dr. John Hunter, PhD, University of Virginia

Dr. Hunter is clinical psychologist and Research Associate Professor of Psychology and Health Evaluation Sciences at the University of Virginia. Dr. Hunter is well known nationally and internationally for his clinical and research expertise on juvenile sexual offending. He has published over 400 articles or book chapters and has been the recipient of seven federal research grants in this area. Most recently he received a "Career Development Award" from the National Institute of Mental Health to further study subtypes of sexually aggressive youth and their hypothesized differential trajectories. Dr. Hunter is a former member of the Board for the Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers and currently serves on the Kempe Center's National Task Force on Juvenile Sexual Offending, the National Advisory Committee of the University of Oklahoma's National Center on Sexual Behavior of Youth and the Center for Sex Offender Management's National Resource Group.

Jan Hindman has studied and researched the problem of sexual abuse for the past 34 years, working with both sexual offenders and sexual victims through mental health endeavors, the educational realm, as well as private practice. She has served in many national endeavors, most notably the Advisory Board of the National Resource Center on Child Sexual Abuse, the National Network for Juvenile Sex Offenders, and the Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers. In addition to her clinical work, Jan Hindman has been a national trainer since 1980, lecturing in every state, as well as most provinces in Canada. She has provided instruction and education to a variety of audiences such as state police academies, judges and prosecutors, child advocacy centers, child protection agencies, mental health centers, correctional institutions, rape crisis centers, For law enforcement and child protection agencies, Jan Hindman developed a protocol for interviewing children suspected of sexual abuse, and her publication *Step By Step, Sixteen Steps Toward Legally Sound Investigations* has been used in police academies and law enforcement training centers throughout the United States. Most importantly, Jan Hindman recently published *There Is No Sex Fairy—To Protect Our Children From Becoming Sexual Abusers*, completing her twenty-year-old goal of providing a resource that addresses the sexual abuse problem at its source—teaching adults how to teach sexual respect to children.

Clinical Certificate Training Program

October 24–26

Beginning at 3:30 p.m.

The clinical certificate training for those trainees who have been accepted pursuant to an application process (see below) will continue for the remainder of the day and through October 26. The Certificate Training will then continue for 10 months with each trainee assigned to a clinical mentor and expected to attend four more days of training throughout that period with periodic assignments and work with mentor between sessions. The training will culminate with a Certificate explaining the competencies learned and a letter that details the expertise of the mentor and the process for obtaining the Certificate.

The training will kick off with a special skills working session with Jan Hindman at 3:30 on October 24th.

Activities on October 24 and 25 will be focused on working in groups and with mentors on evaluation and assessments and case conceptualization along with additional presentations relevant to treatment in a community context. The sessions will end at 3:00 on October 26. Breakfast and lunch will be included as well as books and other materials.

There will be Continuing Education Units (CEUs) available for the conference for social workers, nurses, counselors and psychologists.

CLINICAL CERTIFICATE TRAINING

Application Process for Certificate:

Those individuals interested in enrolling in the certificate program must fill out an application form available on the web site or by calling the above numbers. If accepted into the program, the applicant will be given the forms to register and pay for the certificate program. To be eligible, applicants must have been working in this or a related field for at least two years and anticipate working with this population within the next year. Permission by supervisor will be required. Space is limited. The deadline for submitting applications is September 18, 2007.

Costs of Certificate Program:

If the application is submitted by August 31 and payment is made by September 7, 2007,

the price for the certificate will be \$3,000. If the applicaiton is submitted after

August 31 and/or payment is submitted after September 7 the cost will be \$3,200.

The payment includes attendance for the full five days of the program as well as lunch

and breakfast each day and a full set of materials for the certificate program.
